May Day Traditions

May Day in Ireland marks the celebration and welcome of summer. It signals the start of turf cutting and the beginning of a busy period on the farm. May Day traditions are mostly associated with luck and protection. The May bush is one such tradition. A May bush is a hawthorn bush that is decorated in ribbons, Easter egg shells and cloth streamers. In rural areas, this bush was left outside of the house while in towns the bush was placed in a communal area. The custom of erecting a May bush still survives as a household tradition, particularly in the Midlands.

Maypoles were also popular in larger towns and possibly indicate a certain English influence. People gathered around them for events. In Ireland, the pole was covered in soap and young men were challenged to climb it to claim a prize. Originally, tall trees were used but formal poles in the town centre later replaced these.

Since medieval times in Ireland, there has been a strong association with the devotion to the blessed Virgin Mary during the month of May. Much of the traditions associated with May have been incorporated into the Marian processions found throughout the country. Adults and children collected flowers for crowning Our Lady in town processions. They also use them to decorate grottoes, shrines and church alters.

It provides assistance including grocery and pharmacy pick up's to anyone who is cocooning or isolating as a result of COVID-19 restrictions. This call line launched in April last year as a response to COVID-19 to coordinate community activity, direct community assistance to where it is needed, and marshal the volunteering energy of the country.

The immediate focus was on the elderly and the most vulnerable, and mobilising rapid response in every county to make sure everyone is being looked after. Over the coming months the focus expanded to broader the wellbeing of our society and how communities can work together to help the country through the Covid-19 crisis.

Looped Walks to consider when the time is right

Over the past year there has been a shift in the amount of people taking part in sporting activity but the biggest change is the dramatic increase in walking. During Level 5 we have been restricted in the walks we can avail of, but as restrictions ease the time will come when we can hopefully travel within our county again. With most walkers looking for new ideas for their regular walk here are 3 easy looped walks within our beautiful county that you can consider when the time is right.

Lough Boora- Mesolithic Loop Grade - Easy Length - 9 km Time - 2 hours 30 minutes Lough Boora has become a popular walking spot for locals and visitors alike over the past couple of years. Lough Boora was once a major production site for peat but has been transformed into a sanctuary for wildlife and an amenity for the community. This walk will get you up close with the wonderful wildlife and fauna of the area and it feels like a real oasis of natural tranquillity. There is a café and bike hire on site as well as some great picnic areas along the route.



Kinnitty - Kinnitty Castle loop Grade - Easy Length - 4km Time - 1 hour 30 minutes Start Point - Kinnitty Forest entrance This walking trail is great for leisurely walkers and families alike. The trail travels through forestry tracks along the banks of the Camcor River through spectacular woodlands and brings you into the grounds of Kinnitty Castle. Along the route, you'll also spot bikers using the newly developed National Mountain Bike trails which dissect the walks in certain parts. An added bonus is two great coffee options, which await you when you've completed the trail. Both the Anti-Social café at Kinnitty Castle and Peavoy's in Kinnitty Village are great spots to relax after your exercise.



Mount Lucas Wind Farm Walkway
Bord na Móna has created a 10km public walkwaycycleway around the wind farm. The walkwaycycleway is accessible all year round (except
December 21st) during daylight hours - free of
charge. It is a great location for walking and
cycling enthusiasts alike, and would also be a
wonderful setting for a family day out. There are
some outdoor exercise machines installed and
paths are wide and gravelled. There are several
options for different routes and loops.

The story of the Easter Eggs and Easter Bunny has become a popular part of the Easter celebrations. The story of the Easter Bunny began in Germany many hundreds of years ago. It reached the United States when German settlers arrived to live there in the 1700's. From the United States it spread to other countries.

The legend is that on the night before Easter, The Easter Bunny brings eggs and sweets to children who have been good. In the early days, children would make nests for the Easter Bunny to leave the eggs in. Over time, making baskets became more common than nests. Sometimes, the Easter Bunny hides the eggs somewhere in the home or garden for children to find, this is how the tradition of the Easter egg hunt began. Eggs are a potent symbol of life, renewal and rebirth. Early Christians adopted the egg as a symbol of the resurrection of Jesus Christ on Easter. The modern tradition of eating chocolate eggs at Easter is a fun, child friendly twist on this ancient religious ritual, which originated in Europe during the early-19th century

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Recipe: Hot Cross Buns

Baking buns for yourself is much cheaper with this traditional Easter favorite.

Ingredients

14g / ½ oz. of active dry yeast 100ml / 3½ fl oz. of water 200ml / 7 fl oz. of semi-skimmed milk 100g / 3½ fl oz. of sugar 57g / 2 oz. of softened margarine 1 teaspoon of vanilla essence 1 teaspoon of salt ½ teaspoon nutmeg

850g / 30 oz. of all-purpose flour

4 medium eggs

75g / 2½ oz. of sultanas 75g / 2½ oz. of raisins

Glaze:

2 tablespoons of water 1 medium egg yolk Icing:

 $130g / 4\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of icing sugar

4 teaspoons of water

1/4 teaspoon of vanilla essence

Pinch of salt, to taste

Method:

Warm the water and milk in a microwave or saucepan. It should be warm to touch. Water that is too hot will kill the yeast cultures instead of activating them. In a large mixing bowl, dissolve the yeast in the warm water and milk.

Add in sugar, butter, vanilla, salt, nutmeg, and half the flour, beat until smooth

Mix eggs in a separate bowl then add them into the blend

Stir in the raisins and sultanas and enough of the remaining flour to make the dough soft

Turn the dough out onto a floured surface and knead for about 6 to 8 minutes, until the dough is smooth. Place in a greased bowl and flip the dough over once to grease both the top and bottom

Cover with a damp towel or plastic wrap and leave to rise in a warm place for about an hour or until doubled in size.

Knead the dough down and shape into 30 balls. Place on lightly greased baking sheets

Cover and leave to rise for another 30 minutes or until doubled





Beat the water and egg yolk together and brush over the rolls. Discard any unused egg glaze Bake at 190°C / 375°F / Gas Mark 5 for 12 to 15 minutes

Serving Suggestion:

Serve warm with a dollop of real butter. The great thing about home cooking is adding your own twist to recipes! Customise this recipe with different dried fruits.
